KEY ACTION 1: LEARNING MOBILITY OF INDIVIDUALS Deadline date: 04 October 2023 12:00:00 Brussels time	
Scope	<p>This higher education mobility action supports physical and blended mobility of higher education students in any study field and cycle (short cycle, bachelor, master and doctoral levels). Students can either study abroad at a partner higher education institution or carry out a traineeship in an enterprise, a research institute, a laboratory, an organisation or any other relevant workplace abroad.</p> <p>Students can also combine a study period abroad with a traineeship, further enhancing the learning outcomes and development of transversal skills. While long-term physical mobility is strongly encouraged, this action recognises the need to offer more flexible physical mobility duration to ensure the Programme is accessible to students from all backgrounds, circumstances and study fields.</p> <p>This action also supports higher education teaching and administrative staff to take part in professional development activities abroad as well as staff from the world of work to teach and train students or staff at higher education institutions. These activities may consist of teaching as well as training periods (such as job shadowing, observation periods, and training courses).</p> <p>Furthermore, this action supports blended intensive programmes, allowing for groups of higher education institutions to jointly develop blended mobility curricula and activities for students as well as academic and administrative staff.</p>
Objectives (bullet points)	<p>The objective of this action is to contribute to establishing a European Education Area with a global outreach and to strengthen the link between education and research.</p> <p>This action aims to foster employability, social inclusion, civic engagement, innovation and environmental sustainability</p> <p>in Europe and beyond by enabling students from all study fields and at all study cycles to have the opportunity to study or train abroad as part of their studies. The</p>

	<p>objectives of the action are to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • expose students to different views, knowledge, teaching and research methods as well as work practices in their study field in the European and international context; • develop their transversal skills such as communication skills, language skills, critical thinking, problem-solving, inter-cultural skills and research skills; • develop their forward-looking skills, such as digital and green skills, that will enable them to tackle the challenges of today and tomorrow; • facilitate personal development such as the ability to adapt to new situations and self-confidence. <p>The objective is also to enable any staff, including staff from enterprises, to teach or train abroad as part of their professional development in order to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • share their expertise; • experience new teaching environments; • acquire new innovative pedagogical and curriculum design skills as well as digital skills; • connect with their peers abroad to develop common activities to achieve the programme's objectives; • exchange good practices and enhance cooperation between higher education institutions; • better prepare students for the world of work. <p>In addition, the objective is to foster the development of transnational and transdisciplinary curricula as well as innovative ways of learning and teaching, including online collaboration, research-based learning and challenge-based approaches to tackle societal challenges.</p>
<p>Who can apply? Eligibility</p>	<p>A mobility consortium in higher education can be composed of the following participating organisations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ higher education institutions holding a valid Erasmus Charter for Higher Education; ▪ any public or private organisation active in the labour market or the fields of education, training and youth. <p>Each participating organisation must be established in the same EU Member State or third country associated with the Programme. Mobility consortia cannot be established</p>

	<p>in third countries not associated with the programme.</p> <p>All member organisations of the mobility consortium must be identified at the time of applying for the consortium accreditation.</p>
Consortium Composition	<p>To be eligible, the applicants (beneficiaries and affiliated entities) must: – be legal entities (public or private bodies) be established in one of the eligible countries, i.e.: – EU Member States (including overseas countries and territories (OCTs)) – listed EEA countries and countries associated to the Digital Europe Programme or countries which are in ongoing negotiations for an association agreement and where the agreement enters into force before grant signature (together 'DEP associated countries', see list of participating countries)</p>

Scope	<p>This action enables participating organisations to gain experience in international cooperation and to strengthen their capacities, but also to produce high-quality innovative deliverables. Depending on the objectives of the project, the participating organisations involved, or the expected impact, among other elements, Partnerships for Cooperation can</p> <p>be of different sizes and scope, and adapt their activities accordingly. The qualitative assessment of these projects will be proportional to the objectives of the cooperation and the nature of the organisations involved.</p> <p>Based on this logic, two types of partnerships are offered</p>

	<p>to organisations to work, learn and grow together:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cooperation Partnerships • Small-scale Partnerships <p>These two types of partnerships are presented in detail in the next pages. The information included in the two sections will help you to choose the type of partnership that suits best the profile and structure of your organisation and your project ideas.</p>
<p>Objectives (bullet points)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increasing quality in the work, activities and practices of organisations and institutions involved, opening up to new actors, not naturally included within one sector; • Building the capacity of organisations to work transnationally and across sectors; • Addressing common needs and priorities in the fields of education, training, youth and sport; • Enabling transformation and change (at individual, organisational or sectoral level), leading to improvements and new approaches, in proportion to the context of each organisation.
<p>Who can apply? Eligibility</p>	<p>Any participating organisation established in an EU Member State or third country associated to the Programme can be the applicant. This organisation applies on behalf of all participating organisations involved in the project.</p> <p>Any public or private organisation, established in an EU Member State or third country associated to the Programme or in any third country not associated to the Programme of the world, with exceptions of Belarus and Russia.</p> <p>Organisations established in EU Member States and third countries associated to the Programme can either participate as the coordinator of the project or as a partner organisation. Organisations in third countries not associated to the Programme cannot participate as project coordinators.</p> <p>Irrespective of the field impacted by the project, Cooperation Partnerships are open to any type of organisation active in any field of education, training, youth, sport or other socio-economic sectors as well as to organisations carrying out activities that are transversal</p>

	<p>to different fields (e.g. local, regional and national authorities, recognition and validation centres, chambers of commerce, trade organisations, guidance centres, cultural and sport organisations).</p> <p>Depending on the priority and the objectives addressed by the project, Cooperation Partnerships should involve the most appropriate and diverse range of partners in order to benefit from their different experiences, profiles and specific expertise and to produce relevant and high-quality project results.</p>
<p>Consortium Composition</p>	<p>A Cooperation Partnership is a transnational project and must involve a minimum of three organisations from three different EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme.</p> <p>There is no maximum number of participating organisations in one partnership. All participating organisations must be identified at the time of applying for a grant. As a general rule, Cooperation Partnerships target the cooperation between organisations established in EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme.</p> <p>However, organisations from third countries not associated to the Programme can be involved as partners (not as applicants), if their participation brings an essential added value to the project and as long as the minimum participation from three organisations from three different EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme is fulfilled.</p>
<p>Budget specifications</p>	<p>The proposed funding model consists of a menu of 3 single lump sums, corresponding to the total grant amount for the</p> <p>project: 120 000 EUR, 250 000 EUR and 400 000 EUR. Applicants will choose between the 3 pre-defined amounts</p> <p>according to the activities they want to undertake and the results they want to achieve.</p>

Funding Programme Citizens' engagement and participation Deadline date: 05 September 2023 17:00:00 Brussels time	
Scope	<p>This call aims to support projects promoted by transnational partnerships and networks directly involving citizens. These projects will gather a diverse range of people from different backgrounds in activities directly linked to EU policies, allowing them to actively participate in the EU policymaking process and thus contribute to the democratic and civic life of the Union. The projects will encourage citizens', including young persons, understanding of the policymaking process, showing in practice how to engage in the democratic life of the EU and enabling them to make known and publicly exchange their views in all areas of Union action.</p> <p>The call provides an opportunity to broadly cover a variety of policy areas and contribute to the promotion of EU values, the rule of law, fundamental rights and democracy.</p> <p>Projects should support democratic participation, including by stimulating and organising reflection, debates or other activities. They should also propose practical solutions that can be implemented through cooperation or coordination at the European level, support the sharing of good practices, and ensure a practical link with the policymaking process.</p>
Objectives (bullet points)	<p>Promoting citizens' and representative associations' participation in and contribution to the democratic and civic life of the Union by making known and publicly exchanging their views in all areas on Union action.</p>
Who can apply? And eligibility	<p>In order to be eligible, the applicants (lead applicants (Coordinator), co-applicants and affiliated entities) must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Lead applicants (i.e. "Coordinator") must be non-profit private legal entities or public universities – Co-applicants must be non-profit legal entities (public or private bodies) or an international organisation – Be formally established in one of the eligible countries, i.e.: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – EU Member States (including overseas countries and territories (OCTs)) – non-EU countries: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – countries associated to the CERV Programme or countries which are in ongoing negotiations for an association agreement and where the agreement enters into force before grant signature (list of participating countries) <p>Other eligibility conditions -</p>

<p>Funding Programme</p> <p>European Digital Media Observatory (EDMO) - National and multinational hubs Deadline date: 26 September 2023 17:00:00 Brussels time</p>	
Scope	<p>Support the operations of independent national or multinational hubs pulling together a national/multinational multidisciplinary community composed of academic researchers, fact-checkers, open-source investigation organisations, media practitioners and other relevant stakeholders in order to create a network capable of quickly detecting and analysing disinformation campaigns, as well as producing content to support national and local media and inform about regarding emerging harmful disinformation campaigns. They will work in cooperation with EDMO and contribute to its activities by providing fact-checks, media literacy materials, scientific articles, surveys on disinformation trends, situational analyses and assessments of online platforms' policies to address disinformation-related harms.</p>

	<p>Detect, analyse, and disclose disinformation campaigns at national, multinational and EU levels, and their impact on society and democracy. To this end, hubs will analyse relevant actors, vectors, tools, methods, dissemination dynamics, and targets of disinformation campaigns in coordination with EDMO. Hubs will monitor the evolution of disinformation-related harms on relevant audiences. Each hub will also support a regular assessment of the impact of relevant disinformation campaigns on society and democratic processes, as well as the effectiveness of the policies set out by online platforms to counter various disinformation phenomena. In addition, the hubs will actively participate in the EDMO joint activities of fact-checking and research and promptly react to EDMO requests linked to emerging disinformation issues.</p> <p>Create tailor-made media literacy campaigns for the covered territory or linguistic area. Hubs will leverage the exchange of good practices and materials coordinated by EDMO and contribute to the EDMO repositories with newly created educational and training materials.</p> <p>Cooperate with national authorities for the monitoring of online platforms' policies and digital media ecosystem in the territory or linguistic area covered by the proposal. In particular, they will provide relevant insights which might help competent national authorities, including the audio-visual regulator(s), monitoring the implementation of the Strengthened Code of Practice on Disinformation by its signatories.</p>
<p>Objectives (bullet points)</p>	<p>The European Digital Media Observatory (EDMO) has been created to support an independent multidisciplinary community to tackle the phenomenon of disinformation. EDMO is composed of a central platform and governance which support and coordinate the work of the EDMO national/multinational hubs.</p> <p>The objective of this topic is to finance the work of independent national /multinational hubs for analysis of digital media ecosystems in order to ensure the coverage of geographical areas covered by the EDMO hubs for which the funding is ending at the end of 2023 and in 2024.</p> <p>A national/multinational hub involves organisations active in one or several Member State(s), that will provide specific knowledge of local information environments so</p>

	<p>as to strengthen the detection and analysis of disinformation campaigns, improve public awareness, and design effective responses relevant to national audiences. The activities of the hubs should be independent of any public authority.</p> <p>These national/multinational centres will focus their activities on emerging digital media vulnerabilities and disinformation campaigns, which are of special relevance within the territory and/or linguistic area in which they will operate. Multinational hubs will cover more than one Member State with similar media ecosystems within an EU region.</p>
Consortium Composition	To be eligible, the applicants (beneficiaries and affiliated entities) must: – be legal entities (public or private bodies) be established in one of the eligible countries, i.e.: – EU Member States (including overseas countries and territories (OCTs)) – listed EEA countries and countries associated to the Digital Europe Programme or countries which are in ongoing negotiations for an association agreement and where the agreement enters into force before grant signature (together 'DEP associated countries', see list of participating countries)

Scope	The aim is to organise activities that foster exchange with regard to cybersecurity technologies that have relevance in both civilian and defence contexts: meetings, workshops and collaborative activities between stakeholders of the civil and defence communities, addressing all stakeholders (academic, SMEs, industry, public authorities, etc.).
Objectives (bullet points)	<p>Objective:</p> <p>The objective is to enhance exchange and coordination</p>

	<p>between the cybersecurity civilian (including CSIRTs, law enforcement and cyber diplomacy communities) and defence spheres. This should in particular foster synergies between cybersecurity actions in Horizon Europe, Digital Europe and defence-related actions carried out by the Union through its bodies and programmes, such as the European Defence Agency and the European Defence Fund.</p> <p>Expected Outcome:</p> <p>Concrete activities such as discussions, meetings, white papers, and workshops, which strengthen the links between the cybersecurity civilian and defence spheres.</p> <p>Synergies between these communities, such as common activities to exchange know-how and information.</p>

<p>Funding Programme Boosting Digital Skills of young pupils, in particular girls Deadline date: 26 September 2023 17:00:00 Brussels time</p>	
<p>Scope</p>	<p>The aim of this action is to pilot actions to increase the number of students pursuing digital studies and careers, with a special focus on increasing the participation of girls. It will support joint actions between leading technical higher education institutions, businesses and schools to promote digital studies, through hands-on activities and challenge-based projects. Another aim of this action is to scale up the EU Code Week initiative, putting it on a stronger and broader footing, thus further increasing its impact beyond the > 4 million people reached every year, among which almost half are young women and girls.</p>

	<p>For example, the actions will finance summer schools for high-school students in digital areas, and career days for people interested in digital, with a view to encourage more gender diversity and promote exchanges between higher education institutions and primary and secondary schools on digital topics. Digital Europe Programme consortia already awarded under the first WP could also be leveraged, with a view to give the possibilities to younger students to access the state-of-the-art laboratories, experience the campus facilities and follow seminars from the most renowned experts in Quantum computing, Cybersecurity, AI, cloud, among others. Special attention should be given to the role of girls and women in the digital field, with a focus on debunking stereotypes and tackling the self-efficacy and confidence gap.</p> <p>This action is in line with Action 13 of the Digital Education Action Plan (2021-2027), which aims to enhance girls and women’s digital competences through projects like Girls Go Circular and ESTEAM Fests.</p>
<p>Objectives (bullet points)</p>	<p>Students in digital and ICT disciplines represent a minority, in 2021 they were 4.5% of total graduates. There is also a severe gender balance issue, with only 19% of ICT specialists and one in three science, technology, engineering and/or mathematics (STEM) graduates being women. During the Structured Dialogue for digital education and skills, Member States also report about competition for the few pupils that have suitable profiles and interest in studying STEM disciplines at the university level.</p> <p>In order to fill the significant shortage of sector specialists using advanced digital technologies and ICT specialists, it is necessary to increase the pool of pupils who would be ultimately interested in studying STEM and ICT, with a special focus on girls and women who are vastly underrepresented in the digital field. Boosting the development of digital skills from an early age and in a continuous manner is essential for influencing the level of digital skills of the EU population and the number of male and female students who will consider studies and careers in ICT. Moreover, evidence shows that pupils who are involved in the learning of coding or computational thinking from an early age are more likely to continue</p>

	<p>studying ICT or digital-related fields and this has an impact for example on the number of girls choosing this study path.</p> <p>In the bilateral dialogues with Member States as part of the structured dialogue on digital education and skills, many called for innovative approaches to attract young people, especially girls as of primary school (or even earlier), to digital careers and to encourage a mindset shift in their perception. This action will therefore include dedicated activities to encourage girls and women to take part in digital studies.</p>

<p>Objectives (bullet points)</p>	<p>To grow awareness among European citizens from as diverse public as possible about the role and democratic values of the EU, provide an understanding of the benefits that the EP provides, how EP affects our daily lives and why it is therefore important to vote by participating in the forthcoming EE24, also in the context of the together.eu community (delivering democratic engagement).</p> <p>To support the increased non-partisan civic engagement of European citizens and organisations from as diverse groups as possible while promoting the idea of the importance of voting, thus encouraging active involvement (also as change-makers), with a focus on mobilising voters in the run-up to European Election Day(s), also in the context of the together.eu community.</p>
<p>Who can apply?</p>	<p>A non-profit legal person (including small-scale civil society organisations as well as public and private stakeholders) constituted and registered as a legal entity at the time of application.
